Dear President Biden,

We are some of the largest voter registration and get-out-the-vote organizations in the most politically competitive states in the country. We believe that the new anti-voter laws being passed in many of our states, coupled with recent Supreme Court decisions, will make it harder for regular citizens to vote—and for us to help those citizens register and vote. Some may think we can overcome these unwarranted barriers to the ballot box by just increasing our organizing efforts. We write to tell you unequivocally that that is simply not true.

In 2021 alone, 18 states have enacted 30 laws with restrictive voting provisions and hundreds more have been introduced. Most of these bills target options like absentee voting and ballot drop boxes, processes that led to record turnout—both nationwide and in the Black community—even in the middle of a global pandemic. These efforts will disproportionately harm voters of color and hinder their access to the ballot box, while taking election administration authority away from nonpartisan local officials and giving it to partisan politicians in state legislatures. In Georgia for example, more than half of the state's registered voters who don't have a driver's license or state ID number are Black, which could block them from voting absentee under the state's new law. In Arizona, legislation targeting the "permanent early voting list" will harm those who work irregular schedules and can't vote in person, and disproportionally impact the Latino community. These are targeted efforts to suppress the vote and it's a crisis that demands swift and immediate action.

Our organizations will continue to do everything we can so that all eligible voters in our states have the resources and opportunities to exercise their fundamental right to vote. However, our organizing capacity is not unlimited. We are facing a rising tide of voter suppression unlike anything we have seen. While grassroots efforts remain critical to ensuring fair and representative elections, so too is federal legislation to protect and preserve the rights of the constituencies we serve.

In your recent speech in Philadelphia, you said our democracy was currently facing its biggest test since the Civil War. Now, it's up to you and Senate Democrats to meet the moment you so eloquently spoke of.

We strongly urge you to do everything you can to help make the For the People Act become law. That will help ensure equal voting access for all Americans, and it will help us organize for strong turnout—from all voters—each election cycle. Without it, we fear that no amount of effort will be able to mitigate the voter suppression that we are seeing across the country.
