Likely voters blame the following most for rising health care costs:



Pharmaceutical companies



Health insurance companies



Inflation / Supply chain







The vast majority believe that the federal government should provide adequate funding to ensure hospitals serving rural and underserved communities remain open and are not at risk of closure.



The majority support hospitals, clinics, and doctor's offices being able to consolidate.



Most believe hospitals that operate as part of a larger or regional network generally deliver higher quality care.



Most likely voters would be less likely to vote for their member of Congress in the next election if they supported policies that cut funding for local hospitals.



A majority would be willing to take action to support policies that would ensure access to quality care at hospitals.



Methodology: Public opinion survey of n=1,000 likely voters plus a 200-rural likely voter over-sample conducted online by LSG November 6-14, 2023; MOE +/-3%
