

November 1, 2022 Fall 2022 Policy Survey: Inflation Supplement

Summary: Researchers at the University of South Florida conducted a statewide survey of 600 Floridians to measure public opinion on several current policy issues. The results presented in this supplemental report address the impact of inflation on Floridians and their attitudes toward government responses to the rising costs of goods and services. The survey included a representative sample of 600 Floridians, fielded between October 14th and 23rd, 2022. Topline results are reported below with a confidence level of 95% and a margin of error +/- 4.

Over the past year, a significant majority of Floridians have been severely impacted by the rising costs of goods and services:

- 65% say that inflation has impacted their ability to pay essential bills.
- 67% say that inflation has forced them to draw down their savings.
- 89% say that inflation has impacted their grocery spending.
- 88% say that inflation has impacted their discretionary spending.
- 68% say that inflation has impacted their travel plans

Floridians's wages have not kept pace with inflation. Among income earners, 80% say that their wages have not kept up with the rising cost of goods and services over the past year.

Two-thirds of Floridians are worse off financially then they were a year ago. Just over 67% of Floridians say that they have LESS money available for a personal emergency than they did 12 months ago. Only 7% say that they have MORE money available for a personal emergency than they did 12 months ago.

Most Floridians are dissatisfied with the federal government's response to inflation. More than a third of Floridians's say that the Biden Administration's policies are primarily responsible for the rising costs of goods and services, while 19% attribute inflation primarily to the COVID-19 pandemic, and 11% attribute it primarily to the War in Ukraine. More than three quarter (77%) say that they are either "somewhat" or "very dissatisfied" with the federal government's response to the rising cost of goods and services.

Inflation is top of mind for voters heading into the November 8th **midterms.** When asked to identify the issues that will impact their votes this Fall, 52% said inflation (more than any other issue).

Survey Information

600 adult Floridians were surveyed via an online web-panel using an industry leading market research provider. The survey was fielded from October 14th through October 23rd 2022, and the results are reported with a 95% confidence level and a margin of error of +/- 4. Respondents were selected via stratified, quota sampling to ensure a representative sample. Balanced quotas for gender, age, race/ethnicity, education and party affiliation were determined based on data from the U.S. Census Bureau, Florida's Department of State, and Florida's Office of Economic and Demographic Research (EDR). Quotas were stratified by region of the state for geographical representativeness.
